Recommendation/ Action Steps	<ul> <li>Presents one recommendation, with next steps</li> <li>Recommendation is evidence-informed / well supported</li> </ul>

References/ Resources	<ul> <li>Includes reasonable number of resources</li> <li>Resources are relevant and of high quality</li> </ul>	
Design and Readability	<ul> <li>Writing is clear and impactful</li> <li>Easily understood by non-scientific audience</li> <li>Appropriate use of graphs, maps, models</li> <li>Preferably two but no more than four pages in length</li> </ul>
